

What Can I Expect at a Food Pantry?

Each food pantry in the county, or other emergency food program, have their own intake process. It is best to call ahead to learn the time and days your nearest pantry is open, as well as to ask questions on what you may need to bring your first visit.

Some pantries even take appointments.

Most pantries in Chautauqua County require an ID upon visiting; this could include a driver's license, a student ID or even a formal membership card.

If you do not have ID, do not worry! Pantries will work with you to ensure you get the nourishing foods you are looking for.



A Forest in Need

Many landowners across Chautauqua County own property that contains woodland within its borders. Woodlands, or forests, are a fantastic resource for landowners to have access to. A woodlot can provide recreational uses like hunting, ATV riding, and hiking, or can simply be used for financial gain as a well-managed woodlot. Over the years of use, a landowner may notice issues that arise, like erosion on trails, water crossings in poor condition, or maybe logging roads in disrepair. What can be done to amend these issues?

The Chautaugua County Soil & Water Conservation District may be able to help. One route a landowner can pursue would be through the Agricultural Environmental Management (AEM) program. The District also offers technical assistance to landowners in need at no cost for our consultation. Upon request of assistance from the landowner, a staff member would set up a convenient time to meet and walk the land with the owner. This allows our staff to get a visual as to what could be the root of the issue, where it's taking place, and what would most effectively treat the issue. Staff can suggest a plan of action, provide contractor options, and assistance in permitting if need be. It may also be recommended that a forester help implement a forest management plan if the landowner is inclined to create a healthier, well managed forest, in addition to making some income. Let's say the landowner has had time to review all available options and they decide to pursue the AEM program.

What exactly is AEM? This program is voluntary, and incentive based to help participants in making sensible, cost-effective decisions while protecting New York

State's natural resources. To partake in this program, there is a five-tiered approach. Tier one is utilized to gauge the interest of the prospective applicant. Tier two is utilized to assess the existing stewardship and environmental concerns. Tier three will help to develop a property-specific conservation plan. Tier four's purpose is to implement the best management practices identified in tier three. The fifth tier provides the opportunity to evaluate and update plans. This process has the potential to provide the landowner with financial assistance to help cover the costs associated with implementing the determined best management practices.



Thanksgiving Food Safety

For a food safe Thanksgiving follow these tips!

- 1. Keep Things Clean wash hands for 20 seconds with warm, soapy water and keep counter tops and tables clean.
- 2. Thaw Food Safely- the best way to thaw frozen food, including a turkey, is in your refrigerator. Planning ahead allows for enough time to safely thaw frozen food.
- 3. Keep Hot Foods Hot-keep hot foods at 140 degrees or warmer. Keeping them hot helps to slow down bacteria growth.
- 4. Keep Cold Foods Cold- keep cold foods in the refrigerator until ready to eat or place on ice packs while serving.
- 5. Leftovers- store leftovers in shallow containers and place in the refrigerator within 2 hours of being served.

How to safely cook a turkey

Cook your fully thawed turkey in a preheated 325 degree oven. Use the chart below to determine how long to cook your turkey and use a thermometer to check for doneness. To get the most accurate temperature, insert the thermometer into the turkey breast and the innermost part of the thigh. The turkey is fully cooked when the temperature reaches 165 degrees in both the breast and inner thigh. Let the turkey rest for 20 minutes before carving. Use leftovers within 3-4 days.



TURKEY WEIGHT	COOKING TIME
8 to 12 lbs.	2 ¼ to 3 hours
12 to 14 lbs.	3 to 3 ¾ hours
14 to 18 lbs.	3 % to 4% hours
18 to 20 lbs.	4 ¼ to 4 ½ hours
20 to 24 lbs.	4½ to 5 hours

Building Healthy Habits Recipe

Turkey Cranberry Quesadilla

Serving size 1 quesadilla Makes 1 quesadilla

Ingredients:

- 18-inch whole wheat tortilla
- 2 tablespoons shredded mozzarella cheese
- 2 tablespoons cranberry sauce or dried cranberries
- 2 tablespoons chopped or shredded cooked turkey ½ cup of spinach

Directions:

- 1. Wash hands with soap and water.
- 2. Rinse fresh vegetables under running water before preparing.
- 3. Lightly grease and preheat a medium skillet over medium heat (300 degrees F in an electric skillet). Lay a tortilla flat on the skillet.
- 4. Sprinkle cheese evenly over one half of the tortilla. Add cranberry sauce, turkey, and spinach. Fold empty half of tortilla over filling.
- 5. Cover and cook on each side for 2-3 minutes, or until outside is a golden brown and inside is heated through.
- 6. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.


Notes: For extra flavor, add a dash of cayenne pepper or chili powder before folding the quesadilla in half.
