Separate for Safety
Separate your poultry from the rest of your property.
Use only one entry and exit.



Don't Share Equipment • Don't share tools, poultry supplies, or other equipment with other flock owners.

• Clean and disinfect any shared items before they reach your property.



Keep it Clean • Clean regularly.

• Keep dedicated clothes and shoes near your poultry enclosure to wear when tending your flock.



Keep Flocks Away From Open Water

- Wild birds carry disease: keep flocks away from ponds and places where they gather.
- Don't walk or travel in areas where wild birds may have been.



Don't Haul Disease
Spray tires where germs are most likely to collect.

Conservation District Announces Annual Tree & Shrub Sale

Each year Chautauqua County Soil and Water Conservation District introduces thousands of bare root seedlings into Chautauqua County, New York. All plants that are selected for the District's annual sale are selected for their quality rating for hardiness in Chautauqua County and are made available to the public at an affordable rate to promote landowner conservation.

Landowners can practice conservation by planting seedlings and wildflowers to support pollinators and provide food and shelter to wildlife, reduce heating/cooling expenses, protect water quality with buffers, reduce air pollution and stabilize eroded land. Seedlings are an inexpensive way to replace trees that have been damaged, harvested or lost to disease.

All stock that is sold is bare root, meaning the plant is harvested with little or no soil attached to the roots. Because the stock is bare root, plants must be harvested and replanted while in a dormant state and while soil conditions are still moist.

For the upcoming 2025 sale, the District selected many species that are native to the State of New York, several of which are specifically native to Chautauqua County.

Conifer varieties will be offered: including Eastern Hemlock and Balsam Fir. Several hardwood varieties will be offered: including Common Persimmon and Paw Paw. Shrub varieties will be offered: including Allegheny Serviceberry, Elderberry and White Flowering Dogwood.

A total of two native fern varieties will be offered. A total of four berry varieties will be offered, including blueberries and everbearing strawberries. Apple and pear fruit tree packages will also be offered.



In addition to domestic fruit tree packages, apple and pear wildlife tree packages will also be available. Please note that fruit trees that are included in wildlife tree packages may be slightly misshapen but are still hardy and suitable enough to be planted to enhance or develop a wildlife area.

Wildlife tree packages and conservation seed mixes are extremely popular with local conservationists and sportsman. The conservation seed mixes that will be offered in this year's catalog are ideal for food plots, thrive in a variety of soil types and support wildlife and wild game. (Conservation seed mixes are also available outside of the District's annual sale.)

Tree protector tubes and stakes, tree armor guards, conservation seed mixes and other nonperishable items are also made available during the annual sale.

Chautauqua County Soil & Water Conservation District's 2025 Tree & Shrub Catalog has been mailed out, the deadline to order out of the catalog will be April 1st.

Please be advised that pickup will take place at our Storage Barn located at 3542 Turner Road in Jamestown, New York on a specified date at the end of April. Baring any major weather event, the pick up is anticipated to be April 18th and 19th.

The District would also like to inform pond owners that Barely Straw Pond Kits that are used to control algae can be purchase prior to the annual sale, as the kits should be added to the pond as soon as the ice leaves the pond in the spring for optimal results. Chautauqua County Soil & Water Conservation District is focused on the conservation of soil, water and the natural resources within Chautauqua County. The District upholds this responsibility by synchronizing the efforts of a number of cooperating agencies, concerned businesses, landowners and units of Government in order to implement best management practices that support and promote environmental responsibility.

With the current high price of eggs, consider using a substitute for eggs in your recipe. Eggs leaven (rise) a baked good, by trapping pockets of air and helping the batter to expand (think pancakes). They hold ingredients together, like meatballs. Additionally, eggs add moisture to a recipe.

<u>To leaven</u>- 1/4 cup of carbonated water or 1 tablespoon of vinegar and 1 teaspoon of baking soda <u>Hold together-</u> 3 tablespoons canned bean liquid also known as aquafaba (1 egg or egg whites) <u>Moisture-</u> 1/4 cup of buttermilk or milk (dairy or non-dairy)

Recipe

Broccoli Cheddar Soup

Makes 4 servings, one serving is 1 cup <u>Ingredients</u>

- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup shredded carrot
- 1 1/2 teaspoons butter
- 2 cups low-sodium broth (any type)
- 2 cups chopped broccoli (fresh or frozen)
- 1 cup nonfat or 1% milk

1/4 cup flour

- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper

Directions

- 1. Wash your hands with soap and water.
- 2. Rinse or scrub fresh vegetables under running water before preparing.
- 3. In a medium saucepan over medium-high heat, sauté onion and carrot in butter until onions begin to brown. add broth and broccoli. Simmer until broccoli is tender, 5-7 minutes.
- 4. In another container, slowly stir the milk into the flour until smooth. Stir the milk mixture into the soup. Bring to a boil and continue stirring until thickened, 3-5 minutes.
- 5. Add cheese and pepper. Heat over low heat until cheese is melted. Serve hot.
- 6. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

Note: You can thicken the soup with 2 tablespoons of cornstarch instead of flour.
