THE INVASIVE SPOTTED LANTERNFLY

SPOTTED LANTERNFLY (SLF) IS AN INVASIVE PEST from Asia that prefers to feed on tree-of-heaven, an invasive tree species, but will also feed on - and harm - Important New York State crops and plants. Grapes, hops, fruit trees, maples, and walnuts are all at risk. We need your help to protect agriculture in New York State, so please report SLF if you see it.

Stant Environmented

Spotted Lantern Fly has the potential to damage multiple agricultural crops in New York. SLF is a pest of apples, grapes, hops, maple, walnut, and others. New York is estimated to produce more than 30 million bushels of apples each year, while grapes in New York are valued at an annual harvest of \$52.8 million. Additionally, the expanding hops industry and the maple and timber industries would also be negatively impacted by the spread

of SLF.

Where to Spot SLF

SLF can be transported on outdoor goods and equipment. SLF can also hitchhike in vehicles. Look for SLF on:



Landscaping, remodeling, or construction materials and waste.



Packing materials, such as wood crates or boxes.



All plants and plant parts, including, but not limited to, nursery stock, green lumber, fruit and produce, and other material, such as roots, branches, and mulch.



Outdoor household articles, including, but not limited to, tarps, tile, stone, deck boards, and mobile fire pits.

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

- Inspect- vehicles, packages, outdoor plants, structures, toys for signs of Spotted Lanternfly, nymphs and eggs.
- Take picture, then either place in a jar or resealable bag and freeze, OR kill SLFs that you see. Report your findings to NY Ag and Markets.



Reporting Spotted Lanternfly

- Take pictures of the insect, egg masses, or infestation. Include something in the photograph for scale, such as a coin or pen.
- Collect the insect and place it in a freezer or a jar with rubbing alcohol/hand sanitizer.
- Note the location (address, intersecting roads, or GPS coordinates), shipping information, and any other relevant information.
- Email the information to: spottedlanternfly@agriculture.ny.gov

WINTER QUICK TIPS

Building Healthy Habits: Food and Community Nutrition



Make Half Your Grains, Whole Grains

Foods in the grain group include bread, pasta, rice, quinoa, cereal, grits, tortillas, barley, cornmeal, oats, and popcorn. The grain group includes whole and refined grains. Whole grain foods are the healthier choice because they keep the whole grain kernel - the germ, endosperm, and bran. Whole grain foods include whole wheat bread, brown rice, whole wheat tortillas, quinoa, oats, whole wheat pasta, and popcorn.





Cornell Cooperative Extension

Refined grains are grains where the bran and germ are removed while milling the grain into flour. Removing the bran and germ removes the fiber, iron, and many B vitamins. Makers of refined grain foods like white bread, pasta, white rice, and crackers often add iron and B vitamins back into the product. Try to make half your grain choices, whole grain foods.
